Editorial

Usually at this time of year, as the seasons change, we look to making a change in our lives, perhaps a new start or a chance to do something new or different. This year is certainly different. Our children, now back at school and pre-school, seem to have coped well with the changes to their normal routines (see articles on pages 5 and 15). Our 'new normal' is about less social contact, face masks, sanitisers, online meetings, working from home and restrictions on meeting up together. Sadly, it has meant that there are few village events to report on here.

Our centre pages have our usual run-through at this time of year of 'What's On' in the village. Many of the regular village clubs and activities are either suspended or being run online but keep fit, pilates and dance are running as usual, as are coffee meetups in the Church Room and up at Root 1 café. The tennis courts have re-opened and there is football on the Rec. The village hall is open for booking with Covid safety restrictions in place (see page 8). Services at St Agatha's church have resumed (page 9), and the Red Lion is open for both take away and dine-in services (see page 14). So, we do have some normality back at least (though by the time you read this it might have all changed again!).

One popular event in the village calendar which I am glad is happening is our village Apple Day, or Weekend this year. With some creative thinking, the Orchard Group have managed to plan an Apple Day with a difference, see page 4. It seems a long time ago now on a cold January day when we merrily woke up our village orchards at our Wassail. But it seems to have worked! We have a bumper harvest of fruit this year.

Did you learn something from lockdown? Some amusing and thoughtful one-liners from villagers are shown on page 11. Our enforced time at home made many of us reflect also on what a lovely part of the country we live in and our wish to cherish it. The impact of streetlights on the bypass is causing a lot of concern, as is the proposed tree felling works due to take place over the winter (see Parish Council report, page 7). We see more cars and vans trying to pass on our narrow lanes and there are more cars parked around the War Memorial and at the junction of Brightwell Street and Church Lane. Irresponsible parking means that it can be difficult to see clearly both ways at this junction sometimes and large vehicles (such as the refuse lorries) are restricted from getting down to the Manor. A fire engine would have difficulty!

A bumper Brightwell apple harvest

Have you walked through the orchard yet this autumn? The trees are laden with fruit and the wildflower meadow has all been cut. This year's bumper harvest around the village is all due to the fantastic Wassail last winter. It worked!

At the end of the summer a gang of volunteers scythed the wildflowers in the orchard, which had grown to waist height, using traditional wooden Austrian scythes. It takes a bit of time to get the hang of it but once you get the technique, the effort is very satisfying and took just 2 hours. Have a look at some of the videos on the website to see how it is done - www.brightwellorchards.co.uk.

The trees are full of fruit and it is easy to see just how different the apples look and taste. The trick to see whether the fruit is ready is to look for apples on the grass under the tree. Take a bite out of one of these (they only need a wipe on your sleeve) and find out if it tastes great or makes your toes curl. If it does that then the fruit is not ready. Some of the varieties will need to wait until the end of October, even November.

Apple Weekend on Saturday 10 and Sunday 11 October

This year our annual celebration of the village's apples will come with a twist: a display of all the varieties to be found in the parish, plus an exciting Trail of Discovery. Paul Chilton's giant display will be in front of the village hall from 11am - 4pm on both days with over 100 different varieties of apple, all grown in the village and its immediate vicinity.

Experts will be on hand at the village hall display, so why not bring along apples from your own garden or one of your friends and find out what they are called?

You will also be able to follow an Apple Trail looking for interesting and unusual varieties grown in different gardens and orchards around the village. You will be able to download the Trail Map from the website - www.brightwellorchards.co.uk the week before or pick up a paper copy at the village hall on the day. The trail is self-guided, to make sure that everyone can enjoy the village's apple heritage while keeping a distance and keeping safe.

Will you be able to find Ashmead Kernel or King Edward VII? Ingrid Marie or Jonathan? Cox's Pippin or Golden Pippin?

There will be plenty of eating and cooking apples at the village hall for you to choose and take home.

Don't forget to social distance everyone!

Parish Council Update

Site B street lighting on the bypass

The Parish Council is working with Oxfordshire County Council, South Oxfordshire District Council and the Site B developers to try and reduce the environmental impact of the new street lights along the Wallingford bypass. Their installation came as a surprise to us (and it appears SODC). We had always been informed that there would be consultation regarding any lighting scheme. It appears that Wallingford Town Council had been consulted (specifically on street lighting) but not Brightwell despite the fact that the land that the lights are on is within our parish. The need for lighting, along with the need to remove all of those trees last year, seems to stem from the original design for the access road into Site B (which the Parish Council fought against at the start of the planning process). We are now trying to reduce the impact of the lights on our dark skies and to limit the visual impact from the village.

Tree works

We have been informed that tree works will be undertaken by Oxfordshire County Council over the winter. Whilst fully understanding that safety has to be accounted for and that works are needed to keep the highways open, we are very concerned over the sheer scale of the works and how their removal will alter the character of our lanes and biodiversity. The level of change, all at once, is worrying - a more incremental approach needs to be put in place. Discussions are still on-going but we may be too late to make any difference to the contract.

Kings Meadow tennis courts

The newly resurfaced tennis courts and basketball practice area at Kings Meadow were finally opened for use on 5 September, after adverse weather conditions delayed the painting and application of the important non-slip coating. Please treat these surfaces with respect and **do not use bikes or skateboards on them.**

It has been very pleasing to see the courts return to use by villagers and the tennis club, plus a renewed interest in basketball. We're sure that the new surface and wall will give the village a facility for enjoyment over many years to come.

Hedge trimming

Villagers are reminded that hedges adjoining roadsides should be kept trimmed so that they do not cause an obstruction and create a risk of accidents.

The Vicar writes...

Our church life has returned to what will be a 'new normal' and all our worship, including weddings, christenings and funerals, is exempt from the new 'rule of six' government restrictions, thanks to all the protective measures that we have in place. Our regular Sunday service at St Agatha's is back at 9.30am, with a physically gathered congregation whilst others join us on our livestream video on the Wallingford CofE Facebook page www.facebook.com/wallingfordcofe (this can be watched without signing up for a Facebook account). The livestream will alternate each week between the 9.30am service from Brightwell and the 11am service from St Mary Magdalene's in Crowmarsh.

For those coming to church, you need to wear a face mask and only sit in the alternate pews to maintain the necessary social distance. The congregation are not yet permitted to sing, but quietly humming seems to work for some people and, surprisingly, allows a deeper concentration on the meaning of the lyrics.

Despite our close fellowship, there can be no shaking hands or hugging when sharing the peace which still feels weird! Hand sanitiser is to be used on entry and when leaving and conversations after the service are encouraged outside the building. We are also required to record all attendees in case there is a need for contact tracing. All this may seem quite onerous, but is necessary as an expression of love for our neighbour until the health threat is lifted.

We expect somewhat larger congregations for Harvest (Sunday 4 October) and Remembrance Sunday (Sunday 8 November) which we hope to accommodate safely without having to turn anyone away, but we anticipate having a booking system in place for our Christmas services, with priority given to regular attendees.

After just one month, we have adapted remarkably quickly and are able to focus on worshipping God who raises our perspective above such things to his eternal presence with us, bringing renewed hope, peace, identity and purpose. Join us either in church or online... "O taste and see that the LORD is good: blessed is the man that trusteth in him." (Psalm 34:8)

Millennium Wood

The wet August has helped the pond/wetland, allowing the habitat to develop. Water boatmen have been recently spotted. I am sure frogs, toads and others will follow. Interestingly, a toad was spotted nestling in a large tree adjacent to the community orchard.

Allotment stream

Ideas have been progressing to create a small stream in place of the long pipe that takes flow from the moat to the channel in the recreation ground. In particular, we have been working with the orchard group to combine projects. They are looking to replace some of the ash trees in the woodland adjacent to the orchard which are, or likely to be, suffering from ash dieback. It is planned to have a small display of the proposals in the old red telephone box opposite the Red Lion in October.

Weather

The rainfall recorded at Highlands Farm was: July 45.2mm and August 79.6mm (second wettest month this year). July was below average with August around 25% above the long-term average. In addition to being rather wet, August produced a wide range of weather with some very hot days followed by two named storms, Ellen and Francis. It felt like traditional English summer holiday weather!

Below is the Met Office summary for summer 2020 (June, July, August) and how it compares with the 1981 to 2010 average.

The summer of 2020 saw temperatures averaging out slightly above average, especially in the south-east, with June and August being warmer than average but July rather cooler. After the sunny and dry spring, these three months were mostly unsettled, but each summer month did contain some hot weather. The last day of July brought a one-off hot day to central and southern England, and a more sustained period of heat occurred in the second week of August. Many places had plenty of rain through the summer, and sunshine was below average for most areas.

Here at the Red Lion, it has been a challenging few months since we reopened after lockdown but Mouse and I want to thank everyone for their continued support. I won't lie and say it's been an easy few months but with a great team of staff and our loyal locals, we have managed to keep going.

Since the last issue, we have hired a new chef and his name is Alex. Alex has been a chef for just under 10 years so has lots of experience. He has very quickly settled in and gave us a new lunch menu. Along with Zak, they are both working wonders in the kitchen with lots of positive reviews of their food. I am sure those who dine in the pub will agree that the menu really does suit everyone and with an ever changing Pie of the Day and Catch of the Day, there is always something to choose from. We are seeing the restaurant filling up more on a regular basis so we highly recommend that you book a table, especially if you wish to sit inside and eat.

For those villagers who prefer not to eat out as yet, we continue to offer a takeaway food service on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. The weekly menu is posted on Facebook and the village website and emailed out each Sunday. Latest Covid Guidelines

Following on from the latest Government's Covid guidelines, we have gone through our Risk Assessment to ensure that we are going above and beyond what we must do to ensure everyone is as safe as possible. We would like to update everyone with policies going forward:

- Track and Trace T&T is now mandatory for all pubs/restaurants. We have always requested details but we now must do this by law. We have a QR code which is displayed around the pub and we ask everyone with a smart phone to register each visit by scanning the code and then entering your details. The app we are using is called evePass and we would encourage anyone coming to the pub to download the app before your next visit. For anyone without a smart phone we will of course continue to sign you in with pen & paper. Please note, evePass does nothing with your details and all logs of visits are destroyed 30 days after and are used only if requested by the NHS.
- Maximum groups of six To ensure we do not have any groups larger than six, we will not be taking any bookings of more than six

Sundays 10.30 Kick-off

people UNLESS it is one family all from the same household (for example, Mum, Dad & five children).

As a business, we are responsible for ensuring the law is followed and we are not allowed to encourage group gatherings by offering to sit groups of friends together. If you sit in the restaurant or the garden, we must ask that you are seated at all times and not mixing with other tables. This also includes children who must remain seated at all times.

• **Hand Sanitiser** - As a reminder, we have hand sanitiser available at all doors and a large dispenser inside the pub and we ask that you regularly sanitise your hands when visiting us.

Mouse and I want nothing more than to stay open and not be forced to close the doors again and if everyone follows our policies, we will have ourselves a very safe & happy environment for all to enjoy.

Opening hours

Since re-opening, we have altered the opening hours of the pub and they are as follows:

Monday - Closed All Day. Tuesday - 5-10pm No Food Served, Drinks Only. Wednesday & Thursday 12-3pm & 6-10pm. Friday & Saturday 12-3pm & 6-11pm. Sunday 12-9pm.

Lunch is served 12-2pm (2.30pm Sunday) and dinner is from 6.00-8.15pm. These times may occasionally change but we will always keep you updated via email and social media.

Thank you once again for everybody's continued support, stay safe and well and please be assured that if you visit the pub, we are working extremely hard to ensure a safe, clean and happy environment for all,

Brightwell Pre-school - What difference?

We have cleaned, we have cleared, we have wiped, we have stored, we have moved, we have planned, and we have fully re-opened! How wonderful it is to see these happy children running in with their backpacks and not looking back. The children have experienced huge change in their short lives so far.

We ask ourselves "How can they possibly make sense of this change?" and "What will they make of this strange place we now call pre-school?".

Reducing the number of toys available, the equipment, the cushions, the rugs or anything that would cause the spread of infection was a saddening time for us as a pre-school when we changed our setting into what we felt to be a clinical environment. It was a nervous time for staff reopening without the things we thought the children relied upon and loved.

<u>Lesson 1</u>: the truth seems to be that they didn't need all of that stuff in the first place and it was us as adults who were finding it harder to accept the change. The children are just as happy without the extras. It turns out people are the most important thing in the end after all.

Restricting visitors on-site has meant parents/carers are leaving their children at the gate and unable to come in and settle them if upset. With such a long break, we were seriously concerned this would be extremely heart-wrenching and difficult for children and parents alike.

<u>Lesson 2</u>: small children are actually rather tough little cookies and actually, there was no need to worry because this is now the 'new normal'.

As a staffing group, we have been through a lot in our personal lives, supporting our own families and continuing to juggle to make sure the preschool could support families as much as possible. I cannot thank them enough for their resilience and care. How could we manage to go back to fully re-opening and how would we cope?

<u>Lesson 3</u>: working with young children is like walking into another dimension. What virus? What change?

For the staff and parents of Brightwell pre-school the journey started with closure, then staffing for children of critical workers at the school, re-opening for a small bubble of children in the summer term, and finally closing for the summer and awaiting news of how we could re-open fully in September. A huge thank you to Mrs Lewis and the staff team at Brightwell School. It really is a special place filled with caring people. Another big thank you to Rosemary and David at Highlands Farm for storing lots of bits and bobs we can retrieve later in the school year. Finally, a big big thank you to our wonderful committee for going through this together; I suspect they will never volunteer for anything again.

So, what next? We are not sure how this year will look but we will certainly continue to have fun, share feelings and play. Yes, lots and lots of play. Play is definitely the answer to all of this.

Brightwell Supporting Refugees

I am writing this article five days after the terrible devastation of a fire that has happened in the Moria camp on the Greek island of Lesvos. The situation has worsened considerably – and fast deteriorating. Water and food shortages, inadequate access to hygiene facilities, police use of tear gas, nights of sleeping rough, the physical and mental health of people - including thousands of children. These words are written by *Choose Love* - "the world's first store where you can buy real gifts for refugees" and one that has raised millions for Help Refugees. It is sending out an appeal for support from the likes of us all.

BSR, as a registered charity ourselves, is unable to send donations to them but what we can do is to send out an appeal to you all on their behalf. It is truly a terrible time for those poor people. If you wish to donate you can visit the Help Refugees website at: *donate.helprefugees.org*.

Although BSR hasn't been able to actively fundraise (and now with the 'rule of six' in place, it looks as though we will be prevented for even longer from raising much needed funds), we have been able to send money over to the Hope Centre in Jordan. This will pay the salaries for two teachers for a further six months, up to February 2021, helping to give security to the school.

We are also very pleased that the village school is going to correspond with children at the Hope Centre. The children in Jordan will be thrilled to receive news from fellow school children here in the UK. They can compare their lockdown notes maybe. A recent post on our Facebook page (*brightwellrefugees*) shows how they are managing to stay open at 50% capacity, cleaning the classrooms and school bus between the different shifts Thank you to Fin Lewis for her positive thoughts on linking the school in with Jordan again.
