She had lived here for over 40 years and during that time had been a stalwart of village life, in particular contributing to the development and running of the village hall. Our village depends on people like Viola who give their time and talents to the clubs and numerous activities that make Brightwell a great place to live. They all need to be thanked, but especially Tony Windsor, secretary to the cricket, tennis and football clubs for his contributions often behind the scenes to our sporting life here. Viola Crowe (19.6.25 - 09.6.21)

Viola and Basil lived very happily at the Old Barn in Sotwell for almost 40 years from 1969 until 2009. It was in this lovely village that her life really



flowered. She became immersed in village life, made a huge number of friends and was active in many different organisations and societies. This started with the Women's Institute where she was on the committee for many years. I remember her organising speakers in the old wooden village hall in The Street.

She was very engaged in the move to the 'new' village hall in 1976 which used the converted old school, providing greatly improved facilities. Running costs also increased and Viola, who oversaw bookings, had the task of increasing revenue to ensure these were met. She was enthusiastic and creative in the endeavour to find regular clients and 'The Playgroup' (which became 'Allsorts') set up by Kate Griffin, Lynn Debney and others, was an important early regular user. Viola also encouraged new sporting activities, two of which, badminton and short-mat bowls, continue today. The telephone at home often rang with enquiries about whether the hall was available on a particular day, how much it cost and how to book.

Viola's involvement in the village hall continued for over thirty years. At the end of it she was presented with a beautiful watercolour of the hall with an inscription of thanks which took pride of place in her new flat in Abingdon. Viola was also a Parochial Church Council member and, for a time, a District Counsellor on the Planning Committee.

Having missed out on school due to the war, Viola made up for it by taking an Open University Arts degree and graduated in 1981. This interest combined with her village hall role, brought her into contact with Mary Acton and the Art History group. Viola was an enthusiastic member of the group and organised many study tours to destinations such as Paris, Amsterdam, Rome, Venice, Milan, and New York. She continued attending Mary's lectures after her move to Abingdon in 2009. Viola was a founder member of the Environment Group and cared hugely about developing and sustaining wildlife in the village.


In all her roles, she brought common sense, conscientiousness, enthusiasm, and a great sense of humour. Her strong and long-lasting relationships with village friends were demonstrated when she celebrated her 90th birthday party at the village hall.

Her lovely, sunny funeral service was held in St James' churchyard on 2nd July 2021, by Janice Chilton who was able to bring a very personal touch to her address. She is buried in the beautiful churchyard, alongside her beloved husband Basil.

Yes, it's time for the great Brightwell-cum-Sotwell flower and produce show, reinvented this year to September, on Saturday the 11th, and so hopefully leapfrogging every last lockdown! We have our fingers and toes firmly crossed for that. And thanks in advance to our kind hosts, Jenny and David Dobbin of Sotwell House.

It's THE opportunity for everyone to get producing, flourishing, creating — whether it's in the garden/allotment, in the kitchen, or in the arts and crafts room. Whatever you've been busy at during lockdown, it's the ideal moment to tell the village about it! And whether you are 8 or 80, it makes no difference, the important thing is to have a go. Junior entries are still just 10p, adult entries have increased to 50p per entry, but it's all in a good cause.

Landmark in Time: The world of the Wittenham Clumps

In 1844, Joseph Tubb from the village of Warborough was so inspired by the views from the Wittenham Clumps that he composed a poem listing the momentous ancient conflicts that had occurred within sight of the twin hills. He carved his poem into the bark of a hundred-year-old beech tree, now sadly lost.

The same views have more recently inspired Peter Adamson, a prize-winning author and Sotwell resident, to collect stories about the varied events and characters associated with this landscape. Through online and bibliographic research, he has uncovered and written about many little-known details in a series of 20 enjoyable essays, contained in his new book 'Landmark in Time: The world of the Wittenham Clumps'. Some essays bring to life poets and artists, adventurers and innovators, whilst others contemplate related topics, whether trees, wildflowers, teasels, dog-walkers, red kites or nuclear energy. All should be of interest to those who love the Clumps.

The book is on sale in the Village Stores and in The Wallingford Bookshop. The author will be talking about his book in the village hall on 17 September, at an event in aid of Brightwell Supporting Refugees.

Allotment Stream and Swan Wood Project

Work on the stream has pretty much been completed with the only significant work outstanding being the reconstruction of the inlet structure using locally donated stone. Some trees about 8 or 9 years old that were kindly donated (having been carefully nurtured after being planted by a squirrel!) have been replanted in the woodland. The remainder of the trees in the woodland will be planted in the autumn.

A real bonus to the scheme was the bench that was so generously donated by Clive and Celia Collett to allow people to 'Stop, Look, Listen and Relax'. Sited in the shade by the overfall is certainly a fine place to while away some time and enjoy the surroundings. Hand crafted in wood from Sherwood Forest it is a great addition and will no doubt be much used and appreciated for many years to come. Anyone walking along the stream today would be hard pushed to think that it was only created a few months ago as the vegetation has recently taken a very strong hold – indeed to such an extent the stream has been hard to spot in places! To give the wildflowers a chance, we have pulled up some of the most vigorous self-sown broad-leaved plants followed by a light strim as recommended by the suppliers of the seed mix. We will see whether the hard work yields the hoped-for results although I expect that 'what will be will rule the day!

The information sign has been made and will be erected close to the one for the orchard in the coming weeks when we hope to have a small informal 'opening'. This again has been created by local talent.

We were fortunate to have obtained a grant to cover most of the cost of the work from The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE) with a representative expressing very positive views when she was shown around the site in June. Without the grant the ideas would still be on the drawing board so we are very grateful for TOE's support. And of course, even with a grant, the scheme would not have happened without the willing band of locals who put in so much work!

Weather

The rainfall recorded at Highlands farm was 101.7 mm in May and 82.3 mm in June. Both months were wetter than the long-term average (1981-2010) with May being noticeably wet and cold with around 10-15 days of ground frost. In June the temperature rose to above average.
