All the details of upcoming events are here but you can keep up to date on the village website - *brightwellcumsotwell.co.uk* - or the Brightwell Community Facebook page. We kick off with the Queen's Jubilee celebrations on the long bank holiday weekend (2-5 June), starting with the beacon and fireworks on Thursday night (see page 5 for times) and rounding off with the big Street Party on Sunday afternoon and a band in the Red Lion in the evening. The road will be closed and tables laid out from the Red Lion to the War memorial. Bring your own chairs and picnics, but food and drink will be available from the Red Lion (see page 8) and a Pimms stall at the War memorial end.

The following Saturday sees a return of BrightFest, a great music event and community activity day at the Recreation Ground (read more about it on page 5). Then later in the month there is a charity ball and band night on the weekend of the 24/25 June - 'Save the Bone' - a joint venture between Save the Children Fund and the Bone Cancer Research Trust.

Our annual village fete, including the Flower and Produce show, is back to its traditional time in July with all the usual stalls and games. This is run by the Community Association, but they are always looking for helpers and organisations to take part (see page 6). As usual the schedule of entries for the Flower and Produce Show can be found here in the centre pages. It's amazing to think that the fete has been going for over 100 years. It was one of the first things the newly formed village WI organised in 1922, as you can read in Lesley Dore's article, page 19.

Lastly, on a personal note, I have decided to stand down this year from editing *The Villager*. I have done it now for 10 years, which I think is enough! It's been hugely enjoyable partly due to the great team I work with, but I feel it's time now for someone new to take it on. Parish Council Update

Annual Meeting 3 May 2022

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council was very well supported this year and councillors were pleased to engage with villagers on the work that they do on their behalf. Our chair, Cllr Robson introduced the meeting to council members and explained their responsibilities. Cllr Neilson explained how we obtained the CIL grant and what our plans are for spending it. Cllr Collett clarified how our planning committee works and Cllr Debney outlined the work that he and others had done on rewriting the Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr Baines explained the plans for investigating the potential for ground source heat pumps in the village.

A wide-ranging discussion followed on topics including concerns such as speed limits and parking. Thank you to all who attended.

Road safety

We are pleased to report some successes recently with road safety: a 20mph speed limit is to be introduced on the High Road. A pedestrian crossing across the A4130 has been approved. We are very grateful to County Cllr Pete Sudbury for his help in making this a reality.

These projects will be added to the County Councils task list, which is quite a long one, so it may take many months (or even years!) to complete.

Village hall/shop car park

Mr Frank Thorne has kindly gifted land for the extension of the Village Hall and Shop Car Park. Plans are currently being drawn up to combine it with the existing parking area providing up to 13 additional parking places.

Street party!

As you can see from the poster on the front cover, we are having our Platinum Jubilee Street Party on Sunday 5 June from 1 pm along The Street, on tables stretching from the Red Lion to the War Memorial. The road will be closed to traffic. Music, competitions for children, a Pimms stall, take away food at the Red Lion, and more - plus a band at the Red Lion from 6pm. BrightFest Charity Music Festival Saturday 11 June 1pm to 11pm

BrightFest is an annual music festival and community activity held early in June each year, for families during the afternoon and adults in the evening. The festival has been running annually since 2008 in the village with the aim of raising money for local good causes and community projects.

BrightFest started in a small way in the car park of the Red Lion pub in Brightwell. After a few years, due to its popularity, it transferred to the Brightwell-cum-Sotwell recreation ground.

In 2019 BrightFest was formed into 'a not-for-profit association' governed by a constitution and run by an organising committee (BOC) with trustees who are elected every year and are legally and financially responsible for the festival. BOC decided that future spending of free funds would go to local good causes and community projects.

Historically, the free funds raised have been donated to Save the Children, The Scouts Group, Tree of Hope charity for Maeve Norfolk (to fund her rehabilitation enabling Maeve to eventually walk unaided), and Brightwell Supporting Refugees. The bulk of the funds raised in 2019 contributed to providing new interactive play equipment for children at the Brightwell recreation ground.

This year, in 2022, the money raised will be used to buy a defibrillator at the Recreation Ground and make donations to the Scout Group, Brightwell Supporting Refugees charity and families in the parish where a donation would improve their quality of life. It will also create a 'setting up fund' to ensure the future of BrightFest.

The Community Association collects the funds from each activity. We then invite groups to submit requests for grants from the money which has been raised.

We are always looking for volunteers to help with the set up before this event - one of the highpoints in our village calendar.

Look out for the schedule and entry forms for the Flower and Produce Show in the centre pages of this *Villager*. The show has entry and categories for all ages.

Our aim is to make sure that the fete has a good balance of activities for everyone to take part in and enjoy. Every term is a busy term in any school, but alongside the daily teaching and learning routines across the school and the rapidly increasing enrichment opportunities, we welcomed school inspectors (Ofsted) to the school in early March (thanks to the relaxation of COVID rules).

Ofsted reports can mean a great deal or very little depending on the audience, but there is no doubt that the long-awaited inspection was an important one for the school. Many of you will understand the journey the school and the school community has been on over the last six years since academisation. It is a report we are very proud of, and hope you are too. With comments like, 'Pupils enjoy learning and thrive on being challenged', 'Pupils are inspired to work hard' and 'Staff are ambitious for all pupils', how can we not be.

Most importantly, we are delighted that the inspectors saw our school as we see it; day in, day out, and it leaves the school perfectly poised to continue to deliver a strong education for all our children in years to come. The Environment Group

Running the Group

In January I mentioned that there had been a number of changes in the group with several new members joining which is very encouraging. More recently, I am sad to report that two of the Group's key founding members, John and Annabel Rodda, have felt it necessary to retire from their positions. John and Annabel have contributed a great deal in helping the village through raising and dealing with environmental issues.

Formed in 1995 in response to the call in AGENDA 21 from the Earth Summit to act locally, the Group embarked on a programme designed to involve people of all ages in a wide range of activities concerned with the environment. Villagers have taken part in a range of activities such as hedge laying, surveying hedgerows and ditches, recording traffic and observing and recording the birds in their gardens, in a survey of apple and fruit trees and in a hydrological study of the Parish.

A major project was the preparation of the Parish Conservation Plan in 1998 which later had a second edition in 2014 that influenced the formation of the Neighbourhood Plan. The creation and management of the Millennium Wood, management of St James's churchyard and most recently helping create the Swan Stream are all practical activities aimed at making the village a better place.

I would like to thank John and Annabel for all their invaluable work over the years and wish them a happy 'retirement'!

Swan Stream and Wood

Although I walk pass the recently erected bird boxes, I haven't been lucky enough to see if there are any inhabitants yet – hopefully they are there but keeping out of site. If the national housing boom is being followed, then they shouldn't be empty for too long.

In addition to the ever-developing habitats alongside and within the stream, its use as a training ground for budding water engineers is growing with great fun being had in building bridges and small dams etc around the waterfall!

Weather

The rainfall recorded at Highlands farm was 47.2mm in March but just 10.3mm in April. The local averages for the months are about 36 and 52mm

(based on the records in 'Portrait of a Rural Parish' published by the Group in 2013). Although April was particularly dry, the rainfall was lower in 2017 with only 7.7mm! The Met Office report for the area indicates around average rainfall for March with only about 25% for April based on the 1991-2020 averages. March was notable for some long periods of sunshine amounting to over a third more than the average.

The year the WI came to the village

One hundred years ago, in 1922, visitors to the village would have been surprised by the gruesome sight of rabbit skins pegged out on boards in the gardens, drying in the sun. These had been treated with salt and saltpetre and



were being cured to make warm, fur-backed mittens for the ladies of the newly formed Women's Institute. Members had been inspired by a visiting speaker at one of the meetings now taking place in the Stewart Memorial each month. Fifty-six ladies had joined and with a committee of 18 they were well served with talks and demonstrations on cookery and crafts, gardening and animal husbandry. Lectures on 'Old Berkshire' given by Mrs Squire of Steventon were popular (the village was in Berkshire not Oxfordshire then).

Husbands initially teased their wives, calling the newly formed WI 'Women Idlers' who had found a new excuse to meet for a gossip, but they changed their opinions when delicious new dishes appeared on the table after the county Home Economics Adviser had visited. And then there was a new wool hearth rug by the fire which all the family had worked on, and even slippers fashioned from old felt hats. Miss Joan Crouch remembered her slippers as being too tight for her toes, but the mittens looked very smart and 'were lovely and warm when cycling, if a bit crackly'.

That year, the WI played a major role in the organisation of the Summer Fete in the Rectory gardens. Entrance cost 6 pence, or 3 pence for the evening, but those who wished to dance from 8 until 10pm paid one shilling. The Hon Mrs Cross opened the fete and spoke of the origins and usefulness of the WI. 'Each little village now has its own parliament as well as all the benefits of social intercourse', she said, and she wished that men would have their own institute. Three stalls selling needlework, provisions and vegetables did a brisk trade and there were side shows including bowling, obstacle golf and a bran tub. For the children there was a Fancy-Dress Parade and a tortoise race and even the youngest members of the community were included - in a Baby Show! Altogether the fete raised £56, a considerable sum.

In September that year the committee offered members and their children an excursion to Friar Park in Henley (the Gothic mansion purchased in the 1960s by Beatle George Harrison). Two motor charabancs were hired, friends brought cars, each passenger paid 3/6d, and off they went. The children never

forgot the exciting underground caves with distorting mirrors that made even the most rotund person look sylph-like, and altogether it was a highly successful and enjoyable day out.

Women from all walks of life found friendship, fun and new interests through the WI, and looking back at the records of their meetings and reading their memoirs reveals fascinating details about women's lives in our village in the last century.

Oxfordshire 500: doing more together

'Do your little bit of good where you are' Desmond Tutu once said. 'It is those little bits of good put all together that overwhelm the world.'

That's the simple idea behind Oxfordshire 500. If enough people pledge a small amount of money, together they can make a real difference to local people's lives.

Wendy Roderick and Liz McGivan set up Oxfordshire 500 in September 2021 after hearing about a similar scheme in Bristol. Oxfordshire 500 now has nearly 100 members donating what they can afford, some as little as £1 a week, but together able to commit £500 monthly to help the local community.

Those funds are used in all kinds of ways to ease short-term problems. 'Be Free Young Carers' was able to put on a great Christmas party for 50 young carers in Didcot. Individuals and families grappling with serious illness and other personal issues have had vital temporary financial relief. Four Afghan refugee families had help setting up in their own accommodation.

The key is that all nominations for financial support are recommended by and voted on by members. And there are no administration costs, as funds go directly to individuals or via credible local charities or organisations.
