Meet Corinne Cook, owner, Red Lion



Imagine – you've always dreamt of owning a pub. One day you are scrolling through Facebook and there it is: Lease for sale. The Red Lion, Brightwell-cum-Sotwell. Next day you pop in for a look. A week later you're committed. And then eight weeks after you move in – Covid strikes!

And so began a series of sleepless nights for Corinne Cook who owns and runs the Red Lion with the support of her partner Steve, aka Mouse. She has wanted to run a pub ever since she was a

young kid. On holidays in the Isle of Wight she used to help collect glasses in return for a bar of chocolate or a glass of coke. "I never guessed that I'd actually end up in a pub, it's just always been a dream."

For seventeen years she worked as a travel agent but always doing casual bar work in her spare time. After travel she worked in golf club management starting at Hadden Hill GC but moving to full-time office manager at the Oxford Golf Club. She'd probably still be there if the Red Lion hadn't come on to her radar.

So - does it match up to the dream?

She laughs. "No – not exactly! I've worked in this field all my adult life, so I know what it's like. I didn't come into this thinking we can just sit at the end of the bar all night and have a drink with the locals!"

It couldn't be more different. From Wednesday to Sunday, Corinne is front of house or in the kitchen from noon till 3 and from 6 till closing time. But her day starts around 7.30/8am with an early dog walk with Ruby. Even when the pub is closed, on Mondays and Tuesdays, she rarely has the day off. On Mondays she orders stock, pays wages and invoices and catches up on odd jobs. On Tuesday she preps in the kitchen all day with her chef. Wednesday to Sunday mornings more of the same, then open at 12 for lunch, close at 3, prep again till 6. After closing, she locks up and then places new orders for the days ahead, until finally falling into bed anytime from 10pm-1am. In other words, Corinne is working while everyone else is having fun – what's to like?

"When people have a nice experience, it makes it all worthwhile. If you want to carry on having a social life, you don't do it – your pub is your social life. I love it most days."

All this means she doesn't have nearly enough time to see her two grandchildren. Grandchildren? She barely looks old enough to have children, never mind grandchildren. She says running the pub has aged her. If it has, it doesn't show.

One thing she really enjoys about running our village pub is that she rarely gets any trouble. Brightwell residents are a very easy-going bunch and apart from the odd one being sent home after clearly having had enough, everyone is very well behaved although one thing she would change is the singing ability of some of the karaoke participants!

Her main worry, which she hinted at in the previous issue of *The Villager*, is that the pub just isn't viable anymore.

If Brightwell residents want the pub to stay open after September, when the lease comes up for renewal, we need to support them, just as we did during the Covid shutdown. What initially looked like a catastrophe turned out well thanks to a thriving take-away trade. At its peak the Red Lion was serving 50 to 70 meals a night, four nights a week. "I think people wanted to see the pub survive." And we still do.

Under the current lease, Corinne and Mouse are responsible for all the wear and tear on the building (think thatched roof, water leaks, leaking roof and more) plus the landlord is allowed to put up the rent to match the rise in the retail price index. "It's the rent that's the killer". Their recent 12% increase means they pay up to double on the rent of other pubs in the area, according to Corinne's research. In September, they will try to re-negotiate the terms of the lease to include a lower rent and a cap on rent increases. Without a change in the current terms, the pub simply cannot keep going.

Meanwhile she is calm. "All I can do is put our case forward and I am highly optimistic we will strike a good deal." Let's drink to that!

A lot has been going on in the village churches this year. Easter was a particularly busy time and it was lovely to see the church so full on Easter Sunday. Sadly, however, it seems that outside of major festivals in the church, the congregations at church services in our village has not revived to their healthy pre-Covid levels. That is a shame, as there is so much to benefit everyone within the church family.

With the summer holidays approaching, I am particularly minded to consider what we can do as a church and as a village community together to support our young people whose lives continue to be demonstrably affected by the wider consequences of Covid. Virtual learning, for example, seems to have only created an increased obsession with online activities, bringing with it an ever-growing sense of social – and familial – isolation. There are many older residents in the village who can happily recount the days when the summer holidays would arrive and they would be out and across the fields after breakfast with a packed lunch to keep them going until they returned home for their tea in the late afternoon. Such days would have been spent embracing an outdoor life of activity and adventure, relying purely on the active imagination and the available resources of nature around them. Obviously, things have changed now and this would no longer be considered either a safe or a desirable practice, but it does bring to mind the thought that something should be done within the village to foster a sense of fun, friendship and activity outside the confines of the online world of TikTok and YouTube.

It would be wonderful to restart our Junior Choir – just think how many professional performers and pop stars originally found their voice in such an environment. Another suggestion has been for young teenagers to gather at the Village Hall on selected dates over the summer for a social evening 'at the cinema', and another for younger ones to participate in a guided 'wild nature' walk (to the Clumps?) with a picnic. Closer to home, and for the much younger ones, how about a Teddy Bear's Picnic within the church grounds? I welcome your feedback and for you to come forward with any other thoughts.

And so what about us oldies (adults!)? The church has always historically been a centre for not only Christian worship but for community gathering and support. Every Wednesday from 10-12 villagers are welcome to join us in the parish room for coffee and cake; a great way to get to know your neighbours, to get to know what's going on in the village and, if you so desire, to become involved in giving support to one another. Did you know that the parish room is also available to hire, for a very modest sum, for use as a meeting room or

As well as offering support to the community, the Church also welcomes your support to keep us going. I don't have to tell you how lucky we are to be blessed in our village with not one, but two beautiful and historic buildings. But without your support, these beautiful buildings will soon fall into disrepair. Clearly, we will need to find ways to raise funds for repairs, but in the meanwhile, there are other practical ways you can help us. If you have a couple of hours to spare once a month or so, our gardening team would be very grateful for your help in maintaining our churchyards and grounds which are such an important place for so many in the village. Please get in touch if you can offer some time, however small, to help.

If you prefer the indoors, please help us to keep our churches clean and tidy by joining our small and friendly rota. Finally, if you fancy a bit of exercise and mental stimulation on a Tuesday evening, why not join our bellringers and learn the ropes of this ancient hobby for all ages from 8 to 80+.

There are many other ways in which the church can both be supported by the community it serves, and also itself act as a means of support to that wider community. But please bear in mind that unless we take action to keep our churches alive and kicking, the day will come in the not-too-distant future when the doors will have to close on a vital and beautiful source of community outreach and support.

The show will open to the public at 2pm. Exhibitors are asked to collect exhibits and prize cards at 4pm.

TROPHIES

The Chilton Cup is awarded for the best exhibit in the fruit and vegetable classes.

The Win Glendenning Memorial Salver is awarded for the best flower arranging exhibit.

Two trophies are awarded in memory of Gilbert Talbot. **The Talbot Rose Bowl** is awarded for the best rose exhibit. **The Talbot Cup** is awarded on a points system, but may not be won by the same person for two years running.

The Joan Sheard Cup will be awarded for the best under-16 entry in an adult class. Trophies will also be awarded for the top two junior classes.

The Swan Allotments Cup is awarded for the best-kept allotment. Judging takes place during the week before the show.

The Sally Dugan Cup is awarded for the best entry in the creative writing section.

The Bakers Bowl is awarded for the most points won in cookery.

Swan Stream and Woodlands etc.

The wet spring has had the benefit of keeping a good flow in the stream, which, combined with warm weather will no doubt ensure that the vegetation will do very well and attract a good variety of wildlife, especially insects.

The importance of wildflowers, especially brambles, was emphasised in John Bloomfield's excellent talk that he gave to the group at the end of March. There was a good turnout and all who attended were very impressed by the quality of John's photography and knowledge. Seeing a damsel fly with such vibrant colours blown up to fit the whole screen in the village hall was something to behold. John also brought along some of the equipment and guidebooks he uses in his search for insects. John's diligence has paid off as he reported on a couple of insects that he found in the parish which were one of the first recordings in the UK.

The Millennium Wood has recently gained a bug hotel of a grand design, it being several storeys high. It was kindly built and installed by the scouts which is much appreciated, as I am sure it will be by the many visiting bugs!

Weather

The rainfall recorded at Highlands farm was 109.1mm and 60.9mm respectively for March and April. March was particularly wet with 39.7mm being recorded on the 31st! Indeed, the Met Office reports that rainfall in March was over double the long-term average for southern England and the third wettest for England in 188 years. The April rainfall was below average. Taken together, March and April were slightly cooler with less sunshine than 1991 to 2020 average. No wonder the springs are running well.

Whether I was in Wantage, Didcot, Grove or Wallingford, the mood was upbeat, people were having a good time and there was plenty of food, music and activities. The Coronation itself passed off perfectly, despite the weather – and the concert was great too. It was another reminder of how this country can do events like this better than anywhere else.

While we're still crunching the data, I wanted to thank everyone who completed my health services survey. I've had responses from nearly 3,000 people, which is a really great number to give a picture of what people are feeling across the constituency.

It's clear that, as I expected and as my inbox reflects, many people feel we do not have the health services we need. Nor do I. People particularly struggle to get an appointment with a doctor or with a dentist, but this is not the only thing that people would like to see more of when it comes to health. I will continue to campaign hard on this – watch this space.
