### Tony Hayzelden

I have been privileged to have known Tony and Shirley for many years. As friends we have shared many happy times together; including supporting many village events. And Tony was very much a villager, involved with many groups in the community and a familiar sight as he cycled around the village on his way to one of his commitments.

He belonged to the tennis and cricket clubs, was a member of the history group, a trustee of the Fairthorne Trust, a village shop volunteer and I am sure members of all these groups would have fond memories of Tony and of his involvement with them. He and Shirley both belonged to the village walking group, an activity they both enjoyed.

Tony was for some time Clerk to the Parish Council before becoming a Parish Councillor and then Chairman of the Council. It was at this point that I got to know Tony very well as I replaced him as Clerk to the Parish Council and he patiently helped me to get my computer skills up to scratch and introduced me to the wonders of the Excel spreadsheet. Tony's chairmanship also coincided with the building of the Jubilee Pavilion on the recreation ground which replaced the wooden pavilion burnt down at the end of 1997. This provided much needed facilities for all the sporting activities taking place on the Rec as well as improved facilities for the scouts, cubs and beavers whose scout hall was incorporated in the new building.

Tony was a governor at Brightwell Primary School and also Chair of Governors for a while. He was President of the Royal British Legion branch in this village. In this capacity he would organise and lead the parade on Remembrance Day, which would start at the Red Lion and march along The Street to the War Memorial for the act of Remembrance, followed by the service in church. The plans for this event, drawn up by Tony and Mike Maughan are in use today, as they work so well.

Tony's regular place of worship was the church of St James' in Sotwell and he and Shirley would attend there nearly every week. He was devoted to this church and was the chief sidesman and sacristan for many, many years. Regular church attendance was very important to Tony but he had other interests. The 8 o'clock service at St James fitted in well with Tony's commitment to teaching sailing to young people. After church he would whizz off to Dorchester sailing club, where he would teach young people the joys of sailing.

### Public Neighbourhood Plan meeting Tuesday 4 October at 8pm in the village hall

### The village hall is falling down...

Well, not quite – but it does need some serious love and attention. What's wrong?

The village hall, built in 1870 to be the village school, was not designed for the use it has had for the last 41 years. Some of the problems include:

- inadequate parking and no potential for dealing with this on-site
- the roof needs attention and will need to be replaced in the near future
- chronic rising damp and the timber floor in the main hall is rotting away
- bricks in the chimney have deteriorated and will soon become a major structural problem
- toilet facilities are both inadequate and poorly located in the building
- use of the building has declined and over the past five years the annual income has been less than the cost of maintaining the facility and carrying out necessary improvements

In short, it is not fit for purpose. Simply patching it up will cost a great deal of money and the village needs to decide what it wants for the future.

The village hall is owned by a charitable trust and the trustees have a legal duty to provide and maintain it in order to offer social and recreational activities for the whole village, young and old. With this in mind, the trustees have assembled a small committee tasked with considering how best to meet this challenge and, more importantly, how to develop a 21st century venue that can offer all the benefits of a true village hub. The possibilities are exciting, and with the help of the whole village we believe that we can develop a new, fresh vision for the future.

Your views about the future of the hall are of paramount importance, so the trustees will be consulting you this autumn about the various possibilities they have in mind. Please ensure your voice is heard by responding to the consultation exercise.

# New beginnings at Brightwell-cum-Sotwell Primary School

September is always a new beginning for schools – but especially so for Brightwell School. As well as new four- and five-year old children joining us, we have new teachers in Bramley and Worcester classes, new headteachers, and the school has set sail on a fresh course after a period of interim leadership.

The school governors took a bold decision last July for Brightwell School to move towards a long-term partnership with Wallingford Secondary School to bring strength and stability to the primary school. The partnership will bring support for teaching and learning, support for administration and, most importantly, support for leadership. I am an experienced Oxfordshire headteacher who has taken over at Brightwell School this term; I will hand over the leadership during the spring term to Mrs Fin Lewis, currently a deputy headteacher at Wallingford School. Although she is still based at Wallingford for the autumn term, she is being released to spend some of her time at Brightwell. She will take sole control of the school from Easter.

The school year has got underway with teachers planning exciting learning opportunities for the children for this term. Bramley class (reception year and year 1) are doing a Barnaby Bear topic following the journeys of Barnaby in Brightwell and then to mystery destinations beyond. Children will make their own big books. Russet class (years 1 and 2) are also studying the local area; they plan to visit the village apple orchard, and write accounts of their visits. Worcester class (years 3 and 4) are using a story as the focus for their work – *Kensuke's Kingdom* by Michael Morpurgo. History will be the Stone Age and Iron Age, and the children will be starting violin lessons. Lots of the writing in Discovery class (years 5 and 6) will also focus on a story – *Holes* by Louis Sacher. Year 6 children will go swimming this term, while the year 5 children do baking.

In addition to classroom work, there will be special events through the term, for example the harvest festival at the end of September and a Remembrance service on 11 November. We are also looking forward to increasing our ties within the community in many other ways. If you want to find out more about the school, do look at our website and our new Facebook account!

It's a busy time for the school – new beginnings and the promise of a brighter future.

### The Parish Church of St Agatha's and St James'

## What institutions are essential for a thriving village community?

I think most of us would answer with some combination of pub, church, school, shop and post office. We are blessed with all these and more here in Brightwell-cum-Sotwell. Even though we may not need or use them every week, most of us would campaign to keep them should they be threatened, but they should not be taken for granted: market economics play a role in all of these and the old maxim, 'use them or lose them' will ultimately apply.

Elsewhere in this edition you will be able to read about exciting changes taking place in our primary school as it adapts to become part of the Wallingford Schools Academy Trust. It will retain its Christian ethos as a Church of England school, continuing to benefit from the input of the Diocesan Board of Education but also now from the wider support and commitment of the Wallingford School and the Merchant Taylor livery company's provision for education. We hope that this will restore the numbers of pupils so that the school is not only viable but also thriving, drawing in pupils from outside the village. You will also see that there is a renewed emphasis on engaging with the village community, so I hope that we can all encourage this two-way relationship.

This illustrates that institutions do adapt and change. Today as I write this, I have just run a half-marathon around 17 local churches with sponsorship in aid of the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust, one of the charities that supported our Bell Renovation Project at St Agatha's. However, my fear is that this places undue emphasis on the church as buildings at the expense of 'church' as a worshipping community of people. Several of the churches I visited today have become redundant as places of worship, acting as museums with only historical interest. Obviously, we don't want to see St Agatha's or St James' going the same way.

As a village, we are extremely good at taking on capital projects such as the parish room and bells, but the day to day running costs of the church still need to be addressed. We will be having a Stewardship Campaign for church members, starting on Sunday 2 October with our Harvest Festival when we offer the fruits of our labour back to God in thanks. I hope that we can also find ways for others in the village to contribute to the ministry and mission of the church, not least so that you continue to have your own clergy to take weddings, christenings and funerals.

# Brightwell Supporting Refugees: helping refugees in Jordan

On behalf of the Brightwell Supporting Refugees group, we would like to thank everyone for their support and donations over the last few months.

In July, we went to London to meet Catherine Ashcroft for an update on how the funds from the village events have been spent in Jordan. Catherine is the Founder and Director of Helping Refugees in Jordan (HRJ) and one of our local contacts out there.

As there are seldom places available for Syrian children in Jordanian schools, HRJ has been supporting education in tented classrooms and caravans in remote farm areas. Refugees have settled in these rural communities where there is chance of finding work, rather than in camps where there is little to do. Through charitable donations a building has recently been acquired in the North East Za'atari Governorate. This is currently undergoing renovation and is now registered as a school with the Jordanian Department of Education. This is an encouraging development as this is the first school of its kind to receive this recognition and as such will be able to employ a Jordanian teacher. It is now called The White Hands Villa School for Refugees.

The school follows the UNICEF curriculum, widely recognised both in Syria and abroad. The catchment area is 5 km and there is a bus to transport those who can't manage to walk the distance. School can really help traumatised refugee children by providing a structure, supervised play and education. A typical day is lessons for children in the morning and vocational classes and training for adults in the afternoon. Future plans include adding another floor to the building for music and art therapy.

All the funds raised at recent village events have provided new books for the dedicated reading area in school. The money from St Agatha's Summer Concert will contribute to more equipment and books.

Next Event: Sunday 9 October 'Lunch for Syria' in the village hall from 1-3pm. This will be a basic lunch with a film and a talk – look out for posters around the village.

### St Agatha's bells - project completed

It's amazing – and I think Roy Thorpe has a lot to answer for regarding getting us into this! Couple that with Tony Lascelles accepting the challenge to mastermind the all important fundraising effort, such an initial impetus meant my side of things had to really get organised to bring everything together successfully.

Renovation and refurbishment work of this nature is a longish haul especially the costing, reporting and planning process involved with obtaining permissions from church authorities. Often projects flounder running out of resources part way through, a problem we did not experience with such an excellent fundraising campaign! It is therefore very pleasing to report that the project objectives have been achieved within the budget and ahead of time!

Many thanks to the building committee for their input throughout the process and to the bellhangers and many others who have helped with dismantling bells, renovating and maintaining bell frames and reinstalling – and a special mention to Helen and Chris Baines for recording events and producing the videos so well. Also, tremendous appreciation to those who have helped throughout, whether organising or participating in the hugely successful fundraising events, the grant providers and everyone who donated and gave so generously towards the 'Save our Bells' project.

Quite a bit has happened since early April when the bells were first removed from the tower! Work has included waterproofing the tower roof, maintenance and strengthening of the bell frames and painting of all metal work as necessary – there's a maze of timber and steel structural framework in the tower. The tower has also been reinforced as an essential belt and braces approach to the project – the tower collapsed in 1795 and we do not want a repeat of that experience! Bell renovation itself has included new headstocks on 6 bells, new bearings, new clappers and a weld repair on the cracked 7th bell, new ropes, pulleys, stays sliders and of course tuning. When they are rung, even I can tell the difference!

There is still some work to do in order to complete the overall project but this is not time related. It includes basic cladding to the floor directly under the bells themselves, repairs to the louvres and windows, and possible provision of a safer access ladder to the tower.

A very big thank you to Tony for organising the highly successful fundraising strategy, which enabled those of us planning and managing the work to make timely decisions from confidence, and get on with the job. Tony, the 'A' team

We have welcomed our children this term, new and old, to explore our wonderful new garden, the bulk of which was finished over the summer break. Thanks to some very hard-working parents, committee members and of course, generous villagers, we now have a preschool garden with a mudkitchen, a water wall, bongo drums, a sound wall, and a weaving wall, not to mention the willow tunnel, grass mound, sand pit and outdoor classroom that were installed during the Easter break. We are to have a new sail installed to provide much-needed shade also. ### Tweet of the Season

I am writing this on the first day of autumn, a time when there is a big changeover in our local bird population. This week I saw 100 or more swallows sitting on the wires along the Croft Path, ready to make their way to Africa in the next week or so. They will be joined shortly by house martins and various warblers, such as whitethroat and chiffchaff. Swifts left in early August, they are only here for 3 or 4 months.



This is the first year I haven't noted any breeding spotted flycatchers, a summer visitor that is in decline. The iconic cuckoo is also in decline and I haven't heard one in the village for a year or two, but maybe you have. They have certainly not bred around here for quite a few years now.

In October, redwing and fieldfare will arrive and can readily be seen feeding on berries and fallen apples around the village. Blackcaps will also arrive from Germany for the winter. We have had at least three breeding pairs of these birds in the village over the summer but this population will head for southern Spain and Africa for the winter and will return here to breed in the spring and the German visitors will head back to Europe to breed.

Visiting blackcaps will be joined by many thousands of blackbirds, thrushes, robins and finches come from the continent to spend the winter here in the UK, boosting our local bird population. Believe it or not it's actually warmer here! Many of the birds in your garden this winter, which you may faithfully be feeding, will not be long term residents and will go back to Europe next spring to breed.

Keep your eyes open for what I believe is a new resident, the nuthatch, a handsome little bird that, like a woodpecker, is able to walk up or down tree trunks. In the spring, I saw a pair in the Wellsprings and recently have seen a pair near Brightwell garage. I have received several reports from others of sightings of this bird. Let's hope they stay; please let me know if you spot one.
