May I take this opportunity to thank you all for accompanying me and offering me all your friendship, tea and occasionally something stronger.

Brightwell-cum-Sotwell, for a small Oxfordshire village, contains an amazing variety of people, from all walks and with all sorts of outlooks on life! Blossoming Orchard



Did you walk through the orchard in April or May and see the trees in blossom? It was quite a surprise that so many trees flowered as this is their first spring and had been heavily pruned after planting in November. The early varieties, like Discovery, Grenadier and Katy,

flowered as early as 23 April which is about 10 days earlier than normal. Temperatures of -2 deg C at Benson just a few days later were a bit of a worry but hopefully frosts since then won't have damaged the blossom or setting fruit.

The orchard has been sown with a native wildflower mix and now depends on optimal weather and soil conditions to flourish. Establishing wildflower meadows in a traditional orchard is notoriously tricky, so if we aren't successful in the first season we will keep trying. It is very pleasing to see that wildflowers that once grew in the previous scrub have appeared again - violet, daffodil, bugle, wood anemone and bluebell so far. Blackberries have started to remerge in the corner by the allotments so blackberry picking will resume in the autumn.

If you haven't visited the orchard take a stroll one pleasant summer evening and see how things are progressing. It is nice to see that children have been enjoying making dens in the wild woodland next to the orchard.

Allsorts Pre-School

The Allsorts former lobby area has had a facelift to transform it into an area where the walnuts – the children going up to school in September – can do some activities as a special group. The aim of activities in the new literacy and numeracy room is to prepare the walnuts for school by encouraging them to think about the move and concentrating on skills such as listening to instructions and playing games, for example Kim's game. Allsorts has bought some new numeracy and literacy resources which are in the room if the children wish to use them. We are not actively teaching them numbers and letters but the option is there if they wish to do some 'mark-making', as recommended for the Early Years Foundation Stage. Natasha Fuller is leading activities, and liaising with Matt Wilkinson (next year's school reception teacher) about suitable activities. When the resources are not in use by the

walnuts, they are made available to all the children in the playroom. Pre-school children of all ages have also been over to school to do PE on a Tuesday morning, and meet Pippin reception class in the playground for a 'playdate' on a Wednesday morning.

Our topic this term is Spring, which has led to activities such as making seed collages, pond dipping, playing in the mud kitchen, arranging spring flower displays, collecting eggs, looking at the lifecycle of the chicken, and making rhubarb crumble.

Our Deputy Manager Rachael Hall has just left us (as this is written) to return to Mongewell Nursery. She has been a great addition to Allsorts, bringing new ideas and lots of fun. We are now recruiting to replace Rachael.

On the social stage, Allsorts took a turn to host the pub quiz at the Red Lion at the end of April. The pub was full, with pre-school putting up three teams, and the evening raising £300 for Allsorts. Millennium Wood

The Bach Centre

We don't often recruit new people, but we learned in April that our gardener, Emma Broad, is likely to be moving away from the area in the next month or two. So we will be looking for a new person to take over.

Being the Bach Centre's gardener is a little unusual. We aim to maintain the garden as a semi-wild space that is friendly to wildlife and to the plants used to make Bach remedies. Almost all of the latter are native or naturalised, and in most other gardens would be considered weeds. So while weeding is needed, our gardeners need to know what they're pulling out before they pull it... Everything is done to Soil Association standards, and "flourishing" is preferred to "neat and tidy".

Another part of Emma's job has been to show visitors and students around the garden. You may not know much about us or Dr Bach or his remedies when you start, but we'd want you to learn about us as you go, so you could pick that up too. We'd put you through our Level 1 course to get you started. For obvious reasons there is less to do in the winter; in the summer you might be in three or four times a week, for three or four hours at a time. But hours are very flexible. Pay is on an hourly basis.

It would be good to have a local person, so pop in if you are interested. Aim for a Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday morning if possible so that Emma can show you round. Or send an email to me stefan@bachcentre.com.
